IT wouldn't be Christmas without a cracking record or two! We sent three *First News* readers from Walnut Tree Walk Primary School to the Guinness World Records (GWR) office in London to interview the Editor in Chief, Craig Glenday. They chatted all things recordbreaking, before having a go at breaking some records themselves. Here's how they got on.

Hi Craig! So, what's your main job at Guinness World Records?

It's really deciding what goes into our famous Guinness World Records book every year. We get thousands of applications and we have to go through them all. Most of them actually don't make it into the book; in fact, most of them don't even make it as records because they're too daft or illegal, or just not really records! My team choose which records do get in and which pictures go in. It takes us a whole year to do one book. The minute we finish one, we start the next one, so we're already halfway through the 2026 edition!



Have you broken any records yourself?

No. Because we work here, we're not allowed. But, before I became the editor, I set the record for the farthest distance to stretch a Curly Wurly chocolate bar. I had three minutes to stretch it as far as I could without it breaking and I got to 91cm. Now, the record is four times that!

What's the weirdest record you've had to judge?

We see so many interesting things! I love the fingernails records – Diana Armstrong hasn't cut her fingernails for about 27 years! She just decided not to do it, and now they're 1,306.58cm in total! Another one that I've not adjudicated on but find strange is banzai skydiving. You go up in a plane with a parachute and you throw the parachute out of the plane and you wait as long as you can before jumping out to see if you can catch up with the parachute. It only has to go wrong once and it will never go wrong again because you'd be squished.
